This Month's Program



Professional artist, Don Borie, will demonstrate the method of painting a landscape in oil at the Friday, Feb. 16 meeting of the VAA. He will work from a photograph to illustrate the thought process of the basics to arrive at a successful painting. The basics of Don's demo can apply to acrylics, pastels and watercolors. The

basics include: concept in choosing a scene and simplifying, composition, the values (seeing the scene for impact), a simplified palette of colors, and preparation of the canvas along with tips on painting a strong, convincing canvas.





The meeting begins at the new time of 10:30 am in the Ricardo Montalban room at La Hacienda Recreation Center in Spanish Springs. Prospective members are welcome to attend.

Numerous awards have been bestowed for Don's work in shows he has entered over four decades. His career was in commercial art, designing and illustrating advertising and books. In fact, in addition to a commissioned portrait of astronaut Vance Brand, over a thousand illustrations of Don's work have appeared in various publications, such as: The Artists Magazine, Colorado State of the Arts publication, National Geographic Society offices, and private collections across the country.





Banner Artist Reveal




Last month's beautiful banner art was the work of Bridgette Adams Greb. We're very pleased to feature her as our very first banner artist. Originally from southern Kentucky, Bridgette is living her childhood dream of living in a tropical climate which led her to Hawaii in 1972 and to The Villages in 2015.



Bridgette's formal art training and successful business career in publishing have afforded her the opportunity to focus on her first love, drawing and painting.

In 1999, at the encouragement of longtime friend and artist Peggy Chun, Bridgette returned to drawing and painting - and signed up for a watercolor class taught by a local artist, Helen Iaea.

At Helen's encouragement she entered her first Hawaii Watercolor Society Member Show in October 1999 and won the Bobbie Segler Award for Luminosity, her first of many awards. Her



numerous Best In Show awards and the prestigious Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts Acquisition Award. Bridgette was honored to be selected as a guest artist in the Taiwan International Watercolor Exhibition several years





Bridgette sold her publishing company in 2008, and moved to California with her husband Bob. Bridgette lived in Sun Lakes Country Club for 6 years, continued to win numerous local awards and concentrated on teaching watercolor and pastel classes and special workshops.



Artist



February's featured 3D artist is Dore Via Dumas, of the Village of Belle Aire. Her headline might read, "Service Brat Finds Success in Art". A story full of achievement:

I was born in Virginia and raised in the Air Force. My family moved and traveled all over the world. My mother was an artist and a strong force in my creativity. When we lived in Italy, we went to a mosaic school in Spilembergo and I fell in love with mosaics and glass. As an adult, I decided to learn mosaics and taught myself. I created mosaics for many years.

For the last 40+ years I have been a potter. I tried all forms of art and never felt like it was "me". I took a pottery class and fell in love. Pottery was my profession for many years, traveling shows with my two children and selling in galleries in Florida, Kansas, Alabama, and Tennessee. I sold wholesale through the Dallas Gift Mart. Later in years, I got my Bachelor's Degree in Special Education and a Master's in Library and Information Science. I taught school for 30 years, starting in Orlando, and retiring in Sevierville, Tennessee. In the summers, I was a Master Potter at Dollywood in Pigeon Forge.





I moved to The Villages in 2013 after the death of my husband and soon joined the Mulberry Clay Group and the Sculptors Group. I am the summer kiln master.

In 2016 I went to Italy to take an animal sculpting course. I spent five days elbows deep in clay and five days wandering around Florence. What better vacation than clay and Italy?





Photo Frame

This month we are happy to feature the Fine Art Photography of Eileen Sklon. Eileen joined us in The Villages 14 years ago from Long Island, New York.. Although primarily and originally a photographer, Eileen's early years doing her own darkroom work produced only black and white photos. The desire to include color led her to watercolor and pastel pencils to achieve her desired effects. A 14 year member of the Villages Photography Club and almost that long in both the VAL and VAA, her photos reflect a clear appreciation of fine art.

I have been making photographs for about 40 years. After mastering the "How To's" to a perfect photo, I found myself always searching to do more with an image. I love making impressionistic images and the many was there are to make an image look painterly. Through the years I have drawn and painted on my photos but now I mainly use in camera techniques with some tweaking in Photoshop' There is a certain thrill to this type of photography that I love! I hope you enjoy my take on impressionistic photography.



Gentle Sunrise.

This was taken with a slow shutter speed and a slight horizontal movement of my camera.

(Editor's note – this photo was awarded 2nd place in the Winter LaGalleria Show)



Cattail Abstract

This is 2 separate images. Each one was taken with a slow shutter speed and vertical movement of the camera. I then combined the 2 images in Photoshop turning one of them on its side.

Tips 'n Hacks

Protect Your Paintings/Drawings with a Varnish or Fixative

The life of paintings and drawings can be lengthened if some form of protection is added to the work. The type of protection will depend on the art form. Acrylic and oil paintings can be protected with varnish. Watercolor, gauche, pastels and drawings can be protected with a fixative, or a lighter version of varnish. Using varnish or a fixative may also improve your painting's look and value.

Seven functions of a varnish or fixative:

- 1. Change the surface finish to gloss
- 2. Making the surface more matte
- 3. Provide a more unified finish
- 4. Increase color saturation

- 5. Protection for the paint surface
- 6. Allow for ease of cleaning
- 7. Protection from UV radiation

Acrylic and Oil Paintings

- Varnishing can protect the painted layers from dirt and dust and create an even appearance. Always ensure that your painting is completely dry before adding any top coats.
- For acrylic paintings a gloss isolation coat is applied before the varnish is applied. Later when wanting to remove old varnish, the isolation coat will protect the acrylic painting from damage from the use of harsh solvents. The varnish layer can be either matte, satin or gloss.
- For oil paintings you don't need to add an isolation coat only a matte, satin or gloss varnish coat.
- Apply varnish with spray or brush? A recommendation is to brush varnish for works that are quite smooth in
 finish. However, if the surface has varying levels of thickness, pools of varnish will settle in the nooks. If you
 have delicate multimedia pieces or highly textural works spray varnish will work better.

Graphite/Colored Pencil and Non-oil Pastels

- If you want to omit the use of glass in your framed picture, then a fixative is a good idea. Before applying a fixative, lightly brush or shake your work to ensure there is no dust on the surface. Workable fixatives will allow you to add additional pencil work even after spraying. You may also need several coats for the finished piece.
- Unprotected colored pencil drawings are likely to be affected by wax bloom, which is a white haze that appears over time as the wax medium rises to the surface. Using several coats of fixative will prevent wax bloom and preserve the look of your original art.
- Not all fixatives are alike and care should be used in selecting the right one to protect your artwork. For example, when using chalks and pastels, most fixatives dissolve the whites and light colors to some degree or may change the color. Pick the one that is recommended for your particular medium.
- Never use hairspray as most contain hair conditioners, which are oils that could leave grease spots on your art; and even those without conditioners will likely yellow over time and discolor your artwork.

Watercolor Paintings

• Using a fixative or spray varnish on watercolor may not allow a painting to be accepted by the Watercolor Society or other judged events. Application of a fixative to a painting may alter the colors slightly. For these reasons some artists prefer to put their artwork behind glass, preferably UV-protected glass.

There are many products out there. You should test a product to see if it works for you and your medium. Happy Creating!
