This Month's Program

We are honored today to have international artist Sandy Maudlin with us. Sandy, who has completed teaching two workshops this week, has graciously afforded us time to judge our Gallery Show. Today she will be announcing the winners, and then, as a continuation of our program, will enlighten us on the art of judging art.

We don't usually post lengthy résumés, but Sandy's is worth reading.

Years ago, Sandy Maudlin quit her 'day' job to pursue her love for art. Now a full time, professional artist, she loves to explore the varied possibilities of what paint can do and how she can best express what she's wanting to say. You'll find her continually pushing forward to discover the next surprise that being an artist will deliver. The chase of finding the next painting and the process of doing it are as important as the final outcome is to Sandy.



She enjoys sharing her knowledge with other artists and loves to teach other artists her own special processes that she uses when painting on Yupo using both Fluid Acrylics and Transparent Watercolor, as well on focusing on building better compositions for each painting. Whatever the subject or medium used, Sandy's focus is always to help her art students improve and develop their own unique style.

She presently teaches workshops throughout the country and in Europe, as well as instructing weekly classes in her studio located near Cincinnati. Her workshops focus on experimentation and creativity and are loaded with concise directions and plenty of individual help.

In September, 2018, Sandy will be the instructor for The Villages International Workshop in southern Spain with Beverly Hennessy as her assistant. Much of the time there will be spent painting outdoors with a view of the Mediterranean close by. Any medium can be used during this workshop.

She holds a degree in Art Education from Indiana University, with an area Major in Fine Art and has been teaching workshops and classes for over twenty five years. Sandy has been awarded numerous Best of Shows, including Watercolor Society of Indiana's Best of Show in 2008 as well as the Gold Medal at the 2006 Ohio Watercolor Society Show and holds signature membership in both OWS and WSI. She also served as president for the Greater Cincinnati Watercolor Society for three years.

Her hope is that artists in her workshops will learn both compositional skills as well as new techniques as they create beautiful masterpieces, being inspired and motivated to explore all the possibilities they can discover about making good art. It's such an incredible journey!

In the words of the artist herself, "Making art is exciting and rewarding. It allows me to express myself and share the beauty I see in this world. When planning and creating a painting, I sense that I am on a journey, like a wonderful vacation, which will be full of new experiences that I could never anticipate. The finished painting is seldom what I envision when I start, and I love those surprises I discover along the way.

"Touching that wet paint to a white sheet of paper, exploring what would happen if I tried this or did that, watching the work evolve - it's invigorating, therapeutic, emotional, intense, and often frustrating. Yet, the process of painting and creating is as rewarding as seeing the completed work. It's such a blessing to be able to share experiences in my world with a paint brush."

Events & Opportunities





so I got a job. It happened to be at a high end camera store. There I purchased my 1st 35mm camera. I was there for about 20 months then I started work at the Medical Collage of Ohio, in Toledo. I spent 10 yrs. as a Pharmacy Tech and 20 years as a Purchasing Agent for med/surg supplies. I was a member of the Toledo Camera Club for 18 years serving as president for two years. With my retirement on the horizon in 1998 I started my own very small business in photography and retired from my day job on my 50th birthday in 2001. I moved to The Villages in 2005 with my retiring husband Bill.

I joined the Villages Photography Club in Jan. 2007 and served as president in 2014-15 and 2015-16, and I'm a member of VAA and VAL for almost as long. I have continued my small photography business doing all kinds of photography including events, still life and portraits. I have photographed over 650 dogs since I've lived here, mostly at events where you could do a lot of dogs in one day of appointments on location. The client would receive a finished portrait 2 weeks later. These are not snapshots.



There is always something new and exciting these days to learn about photography especially since the advent of digital. But you still have to use the basics of art including composition, color and the magic of light...

Tips 'n Hacks

Plein air Anyone? Get Outside and Create!

Editor's Note: This is a longer 'tip' than we might see in the future. I have set this in hopes that our seasonal friends will take advantage of those balmy winter days to enjoy creating en plein aire.

Almost any artist will tell you that there's a certain appeal to working outdoors that can't be found anywhere else. To celebrate all of the <u>landscape art</u> being made, here are 10 ways you can make the most of your next outdoor painting session.

Start with a good, long look

Painting landscapes lets you create work that can take the viewer on a journey into a new environment. To create a truly expressive work of art, it helps to take more than a cursory look around and quickly set up shop. Walk around, sit a spell and really soak in the landscape around you.

Focus your eye

Whether it's a rocky cliff or a busy urban street, outdoor settings can offer a myriad of potential subjects. Sometimes, however, it can be too much to take in, leading to a painting that feels busy, cluttered and lacking a center of interest.

Massachusetts-based artist Nancy Colella starts every composition based on what she's visually drawn to. She makes those elements the focal point of her painting and tones down everything else so that they come to the fore.

It's all about the light

Light changes throughout the day, which makes accurately capturing it one of the biggest challenges of painting outdoors. The flip side, of course, is that when one is able to do this correctly, a painting is instantly elevated. Observe the quality of light, aiming for a spontaneous interpretation that still takes observation skills into consideration.

Don't paint a blue sky

Blue skies rarely exist! California watercolorist Dick Cole acknowledges that landscape painting has enhanced his skills as a colorist and helped him to realize that the sky, along with many elements in nature, is made up of a variety of colors and not just one pure hue.



Strike a balance

Spend as much time observing as you do painting. For artist Glenn Rudderow, this is a crucial part of his plein air practice. "Nothing can take the place of direct observation—of being there, seeing, communicating and expressing the spirit of one's subject," he says.

Go for awesome

Albert Bierstadt and Thomas Moran of the Hudson River School produced paintings of the American landscape that were technically masterful, but most of all they were awe-inspiring. They created luminous paintings that seemed too bright to be true. They amplified the elements of the landscape that inspired them most, leaving the viewer with the same sentiments.

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Don't bring your studio outdoors

The thrill of working en plein air is that you can shake up your routine and work differently than you might usually. Use the change in location to try new techniques, such as working on a smaller scale or focusing predominantly on light and other atmospheric qualities. And there is always the real compromise of doing an outdoor session very close to home, as in your own yard.

Colors contribute to a sense of space

When creating her landscape paintings, Kansas artist Kim Casebeer adjusts her palette in order to accurately render atmospheric changes and a sense of space. For example, there is usually more red, orange and yellow running through objects in the foreground, and blue, indigo and violet for shapes that recede in the distance.

Go with the flow—of air

Air moves objects. It ripples water, curls leaves and sways limbs of trees. Use brushstrokes and shading to create movement in your work.

Perfection isn't everything

You can spend all day looking for a "perfect" composition that just doesn't exist. Embrace the reality around you—smog, power lines, even debris—and open yourself up to telling interesting stories with new subjects.
