Demo Artist - Program at April 7 Members Meeting



For our Program, fellow artist and VAA Member **Brian Dickson** will give a short talk on the 'what' and 'how' of "Reverspective" as Patrick Hughes (the original designer of the Art process involved in paintings with reverse perspective) called it. Brian will talk a little about why normal perspective works so well and is able to 'fool' the brain and eyes. He will describe the practical process of producing an Artwork using the regular rules of



perspective in a "reverse" manner. There will be time allocated for questions throughout the talk.

Below are pictures of his extremely varied Art-work - from murals to sculpture, jewelry - silversmithing and Lapidary, Silverpoint (girl's hair), watercolor (banjo), acrylics 'trompe l'oeil' (rope-bridge), blue bottle garden-sculpture, and clay sculpture. The banjo watercolor was used on the cover of a book he published last month - "The Other Life Of Brian."





Recently I have been testing my skills with watercolor. I found that I enjoy painting landscapes, animals, and flowers the most, but occasionally I like to try new things.












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Spotlight on You

March 4th was the deadline for scholarship forms to come in from 12th grade art students in our three county area. Applications had been out since early Jauary to public and private high schools, and also to museum programs and art centers in our area. We want the college bound seniors to have plenty of time to finish pieces and organize their portfolios and biographical write-ups. At this point seniors usually are making some decisions about where they are applying for admission. They are also looking for financial help as tuitions are higher again this year.

The VAA is here, not only to help with that but to support them in other ways as well. Our calls to teachers and guidance depts, college admissions, and scholarship offices can make a difference. They may result in additional funding or a second look at an application. It is another part of what the VAA can do to help with the challenge of becoming a college student and future artist.

This year has been a bit of a shocker!! We received only one application for our 2023 Scholarships. That is most unusual and reflects a still unsettled time in our regional High Schools. In conversations with senior art teachers in our three-county area, it is obvious that Covid had a huge impact on students and programs for the class of '23. Some seasoned High School art teachers retired, and elementary and new art teachers took their place. Other art programs are still understaffed. We have been told that senior student art majors are deferring college and saving money to go at a later time. Others are thinking state schools only...and technical programs.

<u>Our winner</u>, who you will meet on April 7th, is an exception to all this and is determined to start college this fall with an art major, heading toward a degree in Motion Design. **You will get to meet** <u>Lauren Deahl</u>, hear her story and also see her art at our April meeting. As always, she will be awarded her Scholarship Certificate this April, and her tuition support from the VAA will be sent to the college of her choice in August.

In addition to celebrating Lauren, we will have an interesting art program by life-long artist and art teacher <u>Brian Dickson</u>. He has been a member interviewer for the Scholarship program for many years and is a truly creative demonstrator and speaker.

Why is Van Gogh's Starry Night so popular? By Martha Ayotte



Vincent Van Gogh's Starry Night is one of the most recognizable paintings worldwide and is a favorite of art lovers and fans of modern art everywhere. People have flocked to the painting for over a century, drawn to its emotional depth and impressionistic brushwork. In this article, we'll explore the history and significance of Starry Night and how it came to be the timeless classic it is today.




