May you have an especially Merry December, Nan









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Conversations

What is Cubism?

Cubism is an artistic avant-garde art movement that emerged at the beginning of the 20th century which revolutionizing European paintings and sculpture. It inspired related artistic movements in literature, music and architecture. It was one of the most influential art movements of its time and remains so today.

Cubism is characterized by an abstract representation of the world focusing on geometric forms and a fractured perspective. It was created by Pablo Picasso and Georges Braque in France. It was later developed by the Spanish painter Juan Gris.

Cubism was derived from the French word "cubism," meaning "cube." This refers to how objects were portrayed in art, with various viewpoints compressed into a single image. Objects are depicted in multiple planes and broken down into geometric forms such as cubes, parallelograms, and cylinders. These shapes were then arranged abstractly, often overlapping and creating a sense of depth. The artist would also apply neutral colors such as beige, brown, and

white instead of the naturalistic colors in traditional paintings.

Analytic Cubism was the first phase of Cubism, lasting from 1907 to 1912. It defines a style of Cubism that fractures the subject into multi-layered, angular surfaces that bring still lifes and portraiture close to the point of total abstraction.

An example of Analytic Cubism is the "Violin and Palette" (see below) painted in 1909 by French artist Georges Braque. In the painting, Braque uses the Analytic Cubism approach to break down threedimensional objects into two dimensions. The painting features a violin, sheet music, and an artist's palette arranged vertically. The objects in the painting are fragmented and meshed into the background. This fragmentation technique is described by Braque as "a technique for getting closer to the object."

Synthetic Cubism is a phase of the Cubism art movement that lasted from 1912 to 1914. It's characterized by using man-made materials like newspaper, patterned paper, wallpaper, bottle labels, and other textured surfaces. It uses simple shapes, bright colors, and little or no depth.





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An example of this is Picasso's "*Three Musicians*." (see below) *This artwork* presents three figures painted in decorative, brightly colored clothes. It is one of two very large paintings of the same subject that Picasso painted in 1921, both interpreted as symbolic group portraits of the artist and two old friends. In this version, Picasso is the Harlequin figure wearing the bright diamond-patterned suit in the center. The white Pierrot figure on the left is considered to be the poet Guillaume Apollinaire, while the dark figure of a monk on the right represents the poet Max Jacob.

Orphic Cubism is characterized by bright, prismatic colors that suggest movement and energy with pure abstraction, geometric shapes, and an emphasis on rhythm and movement. It was created in response to the monochromatic style of Analytic Cubism, championed by Pablo Picasso and Georges Braque. Orphists used their art to evoke spiritual sensations and signs of modernity. This movement was mainly created by Robert Delaunay (1885-1941) and his wife Sonia Delaunay-Terk (1895-1979).

An example of this is Sonia Delaunay, *Electric Prisms*, 1914 Sonia's Electrical Prisms (*see below*) is both a display of color relationships and an abstracted depiction of her first experience of electric streetlights on a Paris boulevard. The streetlights become discs of radiating color that permeate the entire canvas, but there are also suggestions of solid forms.




