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### Demo Artist – Members Meeting Program

The program during our February 3<sup>rd</sup> membership meeting (on Friday, February 3 starting at 1:00) will be Wesley Stout. Following is his statement concerning what he plans to demonstrate. Don't miss it!

ART DEMO BY WESLEY STOUT



- I found this image on line. I will not exact copy it but create an original in about 90 minutes. The surface will be 18" x 36" primed plywood. The paint will be the acrylic/enamel that I use for murals (similar to acrylic art paint).
- My BRUSHCOMMANDO METHOD is acrylic painting technique developed over a 30 years of mural painting in 43 states and several countries. It is speed, realistic-impressionism, and fun.
- What you will learn is that once skill has been achieved talent is set free.
- My local work includes several murals in the Villages, the Florida Water Fowl mural in Leesburg on hwy. 27
  at the electric substation and the mural at the Leesburg Boat Club. I also have a long history of teaching
  classes and painting canvases including miniatures. For several years I have been painting murals and
  special effects for Great Escape Resorts in the south Lake County area.

When we first arrived, I quickly joined VAA and VAL painting and making friends. Not a formally trained artist, I was a Language Arts teacher in many grades, preferring high school. It is exciting to showcase your artwork in an art exhibition. Still, it can be hectic to get everything ready. However, not only are you displaying your work to everyone, but an art show can create other opportunities for you as an artist, such as commissioned pieces. It also allows you to meet new like-minded artists. Here are some tips to make your show a success.

- 1. Determine what your best pieces to display are. You may want to display all your favorite pieces, but there may be better representations of yourself as an artist. Cut out your weakest pieces. Only select artwork representing who you are or what you are making **now**.
- 2. Frame and wire your artwork correctly. It would help if you learned how to frame your artwork or get a professional. Choose frames that add to the quality of your art, not take away from it.
- 3. Label your artwork. Write your name on the back or on a label, the year the piece was created, your name, title, size, and medium.
- 4. Price your artwork appropriately. Have a price in mind and stick to it. Be sure to include all your costs. If you price your artwork too low, it could decrease the value of your work. If you price your artwork higher, it can show confidence and ambition. Consider applying a discount or percentage off rather than lowering your full price. Reevaluate your pricing every year or so. Take a look back at how many pieces you sold during the year. From there, determine the most popular and to whom they were sold.
- 5. Take high-quality photos of your work with a good camera. Experiment with a range of shots of your artwork hanging on or leaning against a wall. Also, include close-ups without backgrounds and details of the work.
- 6. Make a list of pieces that will be on display. This can be a spreadsheet or a designed catalog in a pdf format.
  - $\cdot$  Titles of each artwork and the year it was created
  - · Size
  - $\cdot$  Medium or materials used
  - · Clear images without frames or other backgrounds
  - $\cdot$  Price of the art and if it will be for sale
- 7. It's a good idea to quickly read your bio and artist statement, primarily if it wasn't written recently. Use this opportunity to tweak or make some changes. Make sure the information is updated and relevant to you at this stage.
- 8. Create a website or update your current one with any new artwork you have created.
- 9. You want to make it easy for people to contact you when you're not at the exhibition. Leave a card with contact info for people to visit your website or social media or contact you by email.
- 10. Take credit cards like Square Trade.
- 11. Be approachable. Greet your browsers and talk to them.

Give your followers, friends, and family a heads-up and a sneak peek into what to expect from your new show.

Hopefully, these tips can help you feel more confident as you prepare for your art exhibition.
