Before we update you on our busy month ahead, VAA Scholarship wants to send out a huge *thank you* to all our Volunteers who helped with the February Art Show and fundraising. Besides running a terrific show, Jo Magram supports and helps us with a Scholarship Café and great promotion for our raffles and sales. Nan Kohr again stored, organized and handled art work donations for scholarship sales. Our Artistic Partners, KC Productions, performed songs from *Man of La Mancha* beautifully and brought in crowds and buyers! Our calls to admission departments and scholarship offices can make a difference ...and result in additional funding, or get someone off a waitlist. It is another part of what the VAA can do to help with the challenge of becoming a college student and future artist.

#### Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Art


