### Painting from Photographs

Some artists only paint Plein Air (outdoors). Most Plein Air artists feel they are better painters. Are they? Certainly, it is more challenging. Shadows move, reflections change, and flowers wilt. You have to worry about ants biting you, sand sticking to your palette, the wind blowing away your papers, and of course rain.

Every day is a beautiful day in a studio or home if you have photos available. They are there when you want to paint and you never have to worry about the weather. You can take your time, listen to music, plan your painting, rearrange or eliminate elements and decide on color combinations. You don't have to race the sun.

On the other hand, photographs can be distorted. Camera lenses can do funny things that we often don't notice right away. Strange angles, and fisheye effects can really make a picture look strange. In addition, if you have a great photo, why would you want to paint it? Would it be a learning exercise? Is it a creative challenge? How would painting it, improve it? If you have a great photo of a weird cloud formation, would you want to paint it that way? Sometimes great photos should be left as photos.

Artist Mark Haworth puts it this way: "The camera cannot see like the eye can when it comes to color accuracy, depth of field, and the warms and cools of highlights and shadows. There's a lot of distortion that comes along with photographs."

If you don't have any photos on hand, schedule a photo shoot. Go to a garden, zoo, or even your backyard and shoot photos. Keep a sketchbook handy in your camera case and take notes of what attracted you to the scene, the weather or even the aroma of a place can give you added motivation when you begin painting. Before dismissing a potential scene because it seems boring, or because you hope you might find something more exciting around the corner, take a second look at the scene in front of you. Concentrate on seeing shapes instead of things full of distracting detail. Use your imagination to uncover hidden potential.

Take detail photos. For instance, if you are photographing flowers, take closeup photos of leaves, buds and stems. Then when you paint you can see the tiny details. There are certain times of the day when photographs are better. Photographing flowers are best in the morning, when dew is still on the flowers and the shadows are at their best. Shadows help define the shapes.

Taking photographs of children can be tricky. Take the photos when they are having fun. Put your camera on rapid fire and catch the children when they don't expect it. These photos are best taken





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outdoors. If you have to take photos indoors, try to photograph them near a window. Lighting from one side is best. It produces better shadow shapes than light coming from overhead or directly in front of the subject.

Next, make a value sketch of your photo. A value sketch is a small, simplified black and white drawing that shows the positioning of light and dark objects and how they relate to each other. Arrange the objects within your sketch to make a good balanced composition. Think of the elements in your painting as shapes rather than objects. Make 3 or 4 value sketches.

Most photographs need some changes before they make good compositions. Give yourself permission to change elements in your sketch. You want to transform ordinary scenes into extraordinary ones. Create works of art that are even more compelling than the scene actually is by using artistic license. Delete unnecessary objects. They can clutter up your painting, distracting your viewers from the main focus. Move objects around, to balance and enhance the scene. Change their size. Even add objects or change your point of view.

After you are done with the value study there are many ways to enlarge and transfer your drawing to watercolor paper. Freehand, grids, photocopying, your printer or projector are various methods. A word about copyrighting: According to the United States Copyright Office, "Copyright is a form of protection provided by the laws of the United States (title 17, U.S. Code) to the authors of 'original works of authorship,' including literary, dramatic, musical, artistic, and certain other intellectual works.....Copyright protection subsists from the time the work is created in fixed form." Copyright gives the creator (or the creator's estate) of an original work exclusive rights to that work as soon as it is created, for a duration of seventy years following the death of the creator (for works created after January 1, 1978). Creative works are automatically copyrighted as soon as they are "in fixed form," meaning that photographs are copyrighted as soon as the picture is taken.

The easiest solution to avoiding copyright infringement issues when painting from photos is to take your own photos. Nowadays everyone has a phone. Take your own photos for contests and original work. Store and sort your photographs. I have all my photos divided into folders and subfolders by subject on my computer. I also have a physical file folder with paper prints, also sorted. If taking your own photos is just not possible, the sites at the bottom of this article, have free images with different agreements. Make sure the images you're copying have no restrictions or have license agreements that allow you to use them how you choose. Although you do not have to give credit to the creator, it's recommended that you do so in order to publicize the artists' efforts and consider donating to their cause.

When entering contests, be sure to read the contest rules. Most times you can only use your own personal photographs that you take, for entries, so the images from the sites below would not be photos you can use for your paintings.
