As for inspiration...I look at everything from the cosmos to microcosms and I am limited only by time and energy.











Meet Betty Eich



What is a Giclee Print?

The term Giclée is pronounced *gee-clay*. The name comes from a French word meaning "to spray." That is what an inkjet printer does; it sprays the ink onto the paper. This process allows an artist to make an exact replica of their original artwork.

There are specific giclee printers for this process. Unlike regular inkjet printers that use ink dyes, the giclee printer will spray a special pigment onto the canvas or paper one color layer at a time. The layers overlap each other where needed. This pigment is more like actual paint and can have actual texture.

The paper for giclee prints has to be high-quality rag paper or 100% cotton. The combination of pigments and paper produces a high-quality print that is resistant to fading and will last a lifetime.

This process was first developed by an American printmaker named Jack Duganne back in 1991. There are actually three different types of giclee prints.

- 1. Photographs that are printed directly from the original digital file.
- 2. Photographs that are manipulated or enhanced in Photoshop or other editing software before being printed.
- 3. Photographs that are manipulated or enhanced after being printed.

Four things are needed to produce a print that is defined as giclee.

- 1. A good reproduction with a high-quality scanner or camera. The image must be at least 300dpi for images smaller than 36 inches x 36 inches. Using a lower dpi would mean losing some detail and accuracy of colors. When using Photoshop, you should select Adobe RGB or sRGB color profiles. The image should be saved as jpeg, jpg, tif or tiff. Leave a border of at least ¼ inch on all sides of the picture.
- 2. The paper must be either archival or museum-grade category inkjet paper, matte, cotton-rag, or canvas. Archival means resistant to deterioration and longevity and acid-free. Some quality papers are:
 - a. Hahnemuhle Matt Photo Rag
 - b. Hahnemuhle Museum Etching Paper (best for long-lasting prints)
 - c. Epson Premium Presentation Paper Matte Good for Matte finish
 - d. Moab Entrada Rag Bright 300 Paper, Get Linin free; Linin can cause the paper to discolor.





- 3. Must be printed on a Giclee printer. Most giclee printers are a larger format and hold up to 12 different color ink cartridges. A giclee printer is miles ahead of any inkjet printer you would find in a home or office.
- 4. Giclee printing requires the use of pigment-based inks. This ink is composed of small colored particles held in suspension.

You can find local giclee printing services in your local area or on the internet. Be sure to give or download high-resolution photos, and check the type of paper they print your art on.


