

#### WHERE ARE ALL THE FAMOUS WOMEN ARTISTS?

When asked to name some famous artists, many names come to mind: Da Vinci, Michelangelo, Van Gogh, Picasso. When asked to name some famous female artists Mary Cassatt or Georgia O'Keeffe may come to mind but is that all? Where are all the famous female artists?

Women were rarely named in history at all unless they were aristocratic. If women worked in art, they did not design but performed the menial work of needlework or tapestry. When women were allowed into the art world, they were limited to portraits or still life.

Famous male artists were born with talent, but they also spent many years studying and apprenticing with the masters. Schools did not even admit women years ago. The first woman admitted to the Royal Academy was Laura Herford. She was accepted by mistake because she signed her name with the initials L.H.

I have chosen three women artists that fought the odds and became great women artists and I have briefly described their lives.

Rosa Bonheur (1822–1899) was the oldest child in a family of French artists. She loved drawing animals and was exceptional at it. She wanted to study animal anatomy, so she got permission from the French authorities to wear men's clothes. Trousers were more suitable to wear in slaughterhouses, and they cut down on harassment by others. Rosa's lifestyle of smoking cigars and wearing trousers definitely defied gender norms. She was financially independent, and she openly lived with two other women during her lifetime. They were all buried together under a tombstone that reads: "Friendship is divine affection." In the painting below, she painted a self-portrait. She is the rider in the background in the turquoise jacket on the brown horse.

Eventually, she was decorated with the French Legion of Honor by Empress Eugenie in 1865. The order promoted her to in 1894. She was the first female artist to be given this award.

The Horse Fair by Rosa Bonheur 1855



Judith Leyster (1609–1660) was a very successful artist. She liked to paint energetic scenes with one or two figures engaged in merrymaking. Judith lived in the Netherlands, married artist Jan Miense Molenaer, and together they had five children. Judith was one of only a few female painters who joined a guild in the seventeenth century. Her self-portrait at the National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C., is

a vibrant and energetic example. She portrays herself as a confident, smart professional, ready for work. It was discovered her entire artworks were previously attributed to her husband Molenaer or to the artist Frans Hals. Her distinctive monogram was found on six of the works. This may have been due to the fact some of her artwork was labeled as "wife of Molenaer."

Judith Leyster painted the picture below. With infrared photography, we can see her original painting on the right was a self-portrait. Judith changed her mind and painted the violin player over her image. Her most successful paintings were scenes of merrymaking.

Elizabeth Louise Vigée Le Brun (more popularly known as Madame Le Brun, was born in Paris in 1755. She was the daughter of a portrait painter, Louis Vigee. Her father died when Judith was 12, so she basically taught herself to paint. When she reached her teens, she painted portraits professionally, but the authorities seized her studio for practicing without a license.

She then applied to the Académie de Saint-Luc, which unwittingly exhibited her works in their Salon. In 1774, the Académie made her a member. In 1776 she married Jean-Baptiste-Pierre Le Brun, a painter and art dealer, and in 1780, she gave birth to a daughter, Jeanne Lucie Louise. On 31 May 1783, Vigée Le Brun was received as a member of the Académie royale de Peinture et de sculpture.





She was one of only 15 women to be granted full membership in the Académie between 1648 and 1793.

In 1787, she caused a minor public scandal when her *Self-Portrait with Her Daughter Julie* (1787) was exhibited, showing her smiling with an open-mouth. This type of painting was in direct violation of traditional painting conventions going back to antiquity.

Elizabeth then became the official portraitist of Marie Antoinette and her family, but she fled from France during the French Revolution, fearing her safety. From that time on, she traveled around Europe but finally moved back to France, where she died in 1842.

Madame Le Brun left more than 660 portraits and 200 landscapes. Her paintings are owned by major museums, such as the Louvre, Hermitage Museum, National Gallery in London, Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, and many other collections in continental Europe and the United States.

These were only three of the few women who fought traditional norms and followed their passion for art.

Is this because women do not have the artistic genius men have? I don't believe so. Over the centuries, society relegated women to child caring and domestic duties. A few women learned to paint from their fathers or brothers, but women could not attend universities and certainly could not study the human body. Painting outside or being inspired by nature was considered too strenuous for dainty females. Society limited women's expectations, but many women prevailed, even using their own children as models and inspirations. These paintings became scandalous.

Things are better today, right? Wrong! Just 11 percent of all museum acquisitions over the past decade have been artworks by women. In the Museum of Art in New York, there are only ten women out of 169

artists. In the National Galleries in London, there are only 21 women out of 2300 artists. Since 2008 art auction house sales totaled 196 Billion Dollars. Only 2% of that went to women artists, and that only went to five women. An article in "Artland Magazine" listed the 30 most famous artists today in order of talent. There were three women listed towards the end of the list: Njideka Akunyili Crosby, Cecily Brown, and Cindy Sherman. The rest were men. The largest art institutions are almost always run by men: of the top ten institutions budget, only one has a female director.

I believe Mickalene Thomas, who is a contemporary African-American visual artist, sums it up nicely. Mickalene states, "These numbers are a little heart-wrenching. This is not about who you are as an artist—there is a system that you aren't a part of. It's still a boys' game."
