DIGITAL ART

Digital art is an artistic work that uses digital technology, such as computers, software, digital tablets or scanners as part of the creative process. Just as traditional artists use pencils, paper, canvases, brushes or sculping tools as part of the creative process. Historically, the first digital artwork was created by Kenneth Knowlton and Leon Harmon. They took a photograph of a nude woman and converted into computer pixels (large squares).

In 1985 Andy Warhol, who used the Commodore computer and ProPaint software created a portrait of a kind of bored looking Debbie Harry.



There are many techniques to create digital art. These are the more popular ones.

- You can start from scratch with a blank digital "canvas" and literally draw with your mouse or digital pen.
- Another technique is to scan in photographs or traditional art and alter them with various programs.
- Fractal/Algorithmics art is made from mathematical calculations
- Dynamic art is painted by an autonomous system, namely a computer.
- Raster Painting is done on electronic devices. You actually paint in strokes just like traditional painting, and you can mimic watercolor or oils.

There are also many programs to create digital art. Some of the more popular ones are Photoshop, Corel Painter, Rebele, Artweaver, and Artrage. GIMP (GNU Image Manipulation Program) is a public domain program, similar to Photoshop, that is free to download. Then there are the easier programs such as Topaz, Fotosketcher, Snapart and Jixipix to name a few. They rely on filters and can manipulate photographs to portray a certain technique, or a look of conventional art.





If you paint a traditional painting in oils, then that is your original painting, and you can sell that as original and also make prints to sell. If the artist creates digital art on his computer, does he have an original? The only way he can, is to makes one print and then destroys the file. That print is the original artwork. He can then sell copies of that print.

Some traditional artists do not believe digital art is really art. They believe all you have to do is press some keys on the computer and you have art. This may be true with some easier software programs, but to become a successful digital artist you must understand the principles of art first, along with computer, photography and math skills. On the other hand, today's traditional artists are having to learn more technology with the use of computers, scanners and printers.

The definition of art is that it is created with imagination and skill, it is beautiful or expresses important ideas or feelings. I believe some digital art meets these criteria. But can digital artworks be considered "fine art"? Wikipedia definition of fine art is: "Visual art considered to have been created primarily for aesthetic and intellectual purposes and judged for its beauty and meaningfulness". I believe Digital art can fulfill this definition. However, historically, there are only five main types of fine art: Painting, sculpture, architecture, music and poetry, and performing arts including theatre and dance. Unfortunately, digital art has not yet made the list.

Steven Friedman, who is an active member of the VAA, is a traditional artist and a digital artist. Steven uses his own photos and paintings to create his work. He considers himself a Master Digital Artist, having spent over 10,000 hours mastering his digital art skills.

At the end of this article are a few of Steven's digital art paintings. They take skill and imagination to create, they are beautiful, and they express ideas or feelings. I personally believe this is art.






The first still life is a self portrait with personal objects: a stuffed cat toy I made, one of my houseplants, and a soda can. This was a digital assignment from my Fall semester.
